Affirming Hope and Each Other, One Story at a Time

A friend admitted some anxiety recently that caught me off guard.

"Hey, Jill, he said, "I can't attend your storytelling events at church because I am an AWFUL performer. I seem to function at a steady creative deficit anyway, so I would fail before even walking in Foundry's door."

He was referring to the "ThursdayStoryThrow," our biweekly gatherings here at Foundry every other Thursday. My story-loving heart cracked with the sadness of his feelings. But I am grateful too, because his candor opened up a renewed and hopefully more hospitable perception of what storytelling is -- at its core. A story – before it ever morphs into a narrative, any type of performance, or a TED talk is the very human assertion of one individual's perspective. These casual story events are based on the implicit promise of unconditional listening. Whoever comes is open to whatever point of view a fellow neighbor wants to tell - whatever their religious, socioeconomic or political vantage point.



"ThursdayStoryThrow" is not about performance. There is no expectation that those who share should achieve a level of drama, energy, or reaction. We are not critics, rather an affirming group willing to give absolute attention without judgment or feedback. We share, listen, and applaud. We empathize with compassion. Then we move on to listen fully to the next storyteller 'throwing out' what is on their mind.

Some share their poetry in quivering, relieved voices that have escaped their oppressive inner critic. We celebrate their courage. Others share life challenges like job loss or a tough conversation or getting lost in another country. We honor human experience by listening without distraction. Every other Thursday, this open-to-all community comes together at Foundry to share a sense of play, truthful perspective, and essential humanness. No preparation required!

What I love most is the marvelous consequence of our listening unconditionally to another's story. This exchange becomes a forum for learning to accept ourselves as well as our neighbors. It is an informal arena where the prime criteria is to listen beyond (or despite) any preconceived assumptions.

There may be no more freeing gesture of hospitality than to let each other's perspective reveal our hopefulness of being seen. As the "magical storyteller" Michael Morpurgo, has said, "Wherever my story takes me...there is always some hope and redemption."

Finally, we will endeavor to develop a stronger culture of generosity and financial stewardship.

Congregational giving is essential to every aspect of Foundry life. Generous and consistent giving supports innovation, new

ministries, and our prophetic work. The spiritual practice of financial stewardship deepens our relationship with God and our community. To achieve our vision for Foundry we must become an even more generous congregation.

These are not the *only* things we will attend to during the next twelve to eighteen months, but by focusing concerted effort on these aspects of Foundry life, we will maintain our current momentum and ensure our future vitality. We are already working to integrate these priorities into our shared life as a congregation. 
Backs Against the Wall: The Howard Thurman Story
