# Christmas at Foundry GREG MCGRUDER

One Foundry tradition I look forward to every year is our celebration of the Christmas season.

From the beginning of Advent to Christmas itself, I'm always struck by how Foundry makes what could be a formal and quotidian calendar event a lively reflection of our congregation's diversity as well as a reflection of the spirit and meaning of Christmas.

For me, it all begins with the lighting of candles each Sunday of Advent which gives families of all varieties a chance to play an active role. We see children who seem to us to have been born yesterday but are suddenly seven years old, gamely reading and putting flame to candle with parental assistance.

I sing in the Gospel and Chancel choirs and during this period the songs we diligently rehearse and share offer a musical narrative to the season. Additionally, every year the congregation gets to witness the thespian skills of Foundry youth during the Children's Christmas pageant, an event that also gives us a chance to see a child who once played the role of the Baby Jesus now play the role of Joseph, Mary, or one of the Wise People — as we designate them at Foundry.

Throughout the season the clergy ensures that the words of the Scripture are ever present, as they also help us reflect that ancient story in our contemporary lives. The striking Christmas tree near the pulpit, the garlands of evergreens draping the balcony, and the bountiful display of fiery red poinsettias at the altar always add a memorable colorful note.



But one of the most striking events is the Christmas Eve service. It is a homecoming of sorts, with evocative music and scripture readings, all culminating in the entire congregation standing in the dark, holding lighted candles and singing "Silent Night."

Every year I marvel at this sight and, even with so many open flames, I've never witnessed an accident. Traditions like these were not part of the church of my early years, but these Foundry traditions, reflecting the spirit of the church as well as the season are worth anticipating and taking part in every year.

In 2001, the last year Bill Clinton was President, the Foundry choir was invited to sing at the White House for Christmas. A friend of mine who was in the choir asked if I wanted to sing with the choir. I had never sung at the White House, so I said yes. After that I started attending and singing at Foundry.

I eventually became a member, served on the Staff Parish Relations Committee and the Board. I co-led the Summer of Great Discernment, that examined same-sex marriage at Foundry, chaired the Journey to Racial Justice group which devised a strategic plan for diversity, equity, and inclusion at Foundry, and I currently chair the Religious and Racial Justice Committee. I moved to DC from Ohio in 1980, right out of Ohio State University, where I graduated with a degree in journalism. For 3 decades I've worked at the National Geographic Society, in book publishing and producing programs and events.



More than a decade ago, the phrase "transcendent music" emerged as the most accurate way to describe the music that is part of worship at Foundry.

Service after service, the truth of that phrase shines through. Foundry has for years been blessed by extraordinary musical leadership, gifted musicians and amazing voices.

No matter the style or selection, the music transports us into a realm combining emotion and intellect, enhancing and reinforcing the message of hope, love and faith we are called to share.

The music of Christmas is especially meaningful to many of us, and this year we will have a service of Advent Special Music on **Sunday, December 15**, which our **Director of Music and Worship Arts Stanley Thurston** describes below.

Don't miss it - note the 10 o'clock time for this one service of "Great Joy!"

On behalf of Foundry's choirs, instrumentalists and soloists, it is my pleasure to invite you to join us on Sunday, December 15 at 10 o'clock for 'Great Joy!' We will all worship together that day at this one service.

You will hear many of your favorite Advent and Christmas songs – "Joy to the World," "What Child is This?" "Go, Tell it on the Mountain" and "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" – in highenergy, cutting-edge gospel arrangements. These celebrations of joy, peace and love, arranged by Michael McElroy, Joseph Joubert and Burl Red will have toes tapping, hands clapping and spirits soaring.

The music will be performed by Foundry's Nine O'clock Choir and our Chancel Choir, supported by Foundry instrumentalists Jidong Zhong on the piano, Dan Campolieta on the piano and organ, Richard Slye on drums, and Mike Pryor on bass guitar, along with guest instrumentalists on saxophone and brass.
