We are at a moment when many beautiful things and people feel threatened in our nation and world. The call to remember keeps us mindful that this is not the first time the world has been in an uproar or when injustice and cruelty rallied their troops. Remembering that God's love and justice has given people through the ages courage, creativity, and strength to persevere, to work for peace and reconciliation helps us keep the faith. Remembering reminds us of our true identity, guarding us from forces or voices who seek to deny our belovedness, our joy, or our place in God's story.

Our memories are like the roots of a tree that go deep to hold us steady and strong even as the winds of the world blow with all their might.

As we journey through the first months of 2025, we will remember together. And, I believe, we will be stronger for it.

A Journey to Light

I grew up on a small dairy farm in Frederick County, Maryland. It was the farm that my grandfather bought in 1917. Our community was so steeped in deep personal and historic connections to each other that I felt we had one foot in the 19th century. I remember it almost with the glow of a Norman Rockwell painting.

The center of our community was the Methodist Church where our families came together. Linganore church was modest, dating from the 1790s. My gratitude is boundless for my parents and the community that nurtured me in those years and continues to nurture me. I learned how a community can celebrate together, and how a community can grieve together.

And in our country church I found solace in the liturgy that connected me to ancient traditions I was too young to understand, but felt the glow of the sacred in how those traditions were honored. I remember the sermons and learning the value of someone helping us understand our faith journey.

And we sang. Everyone sang. We sang all the hymns in four-part harmony. The anthems for the choir were challenging and central to the worship experience. And there were several folks who sang solos in a thrilling way. I was in awe of how they could sing and express the inexpressible. I can see my young self in the pew taking it all in.

In 1981, I came to 16th and P to sing in the Foundry Choir. And as different as our downtown church might seem from Linganore, the through line of liturgy, preaching, and music continue to give me solace on my journey.



And the greatest honor of being a member of the Foundry Choir and soloist is singing for you. For each of you. In your moments of grief and in your celebrations, and especially in your unspoken and unnoticed passages. Please know that all of us making music are holding you in our shared sacred journey. With our voices and with our hearts.

Like the young boy in the pew at Linganore, I am still in awe that singing can pierce the darkness and bring us into the light of our faith journey.
