Be Peace

"Peace always seems a weary way off. As Jeremiah lamented, 'We looked for peace, but no peace came.' But to give up on peace is to give up on God."

-William Sloane Coffin

As we prepare to celebrate our country's Independence Day, I find myself thinking much about how peace does seem "a weary way off." As a nation, we are at war among ourselves, deeply polarized and at enmity with our neighbors. Wars rage all over our world, many carried out using weapons made in our country. Terrorists, military powers, factions, clans and gangs are not the only sources of violence. Poverty, disease, bigotry, and environmental destruction are also each a violent scourge.

It can feel overwhelming, and we might feel like giving up sometimes. But, as the late William Sloane Coffin reminds us, "to give up on peace is to give up on God."

As Christians, giving up on God is not an option. We are to be peacemakers. This doesn't mean we should avoid conflict at all costs — the life of Jesus reveals that doing the will of God often brings conflict. Rather, we are to do the hard work of making peace with justice. We are invited to participate with God in building the Reign of God.

In seminary, I received a hand-made card from a friend that said simply "Be Peace." That is our work. It is our call.

So I invite you to think about the ways you can "be peace" in your family, in your relationships, through what you choose to support with your money and your time. As the beloved hymn says, "Let peace begin with me, let this be the moment, now."



Above all, I urge you to pray for peace. Pray for all those living in war zones. Pray for our women and men in military service. Pray for world leaders and for relief workers. Pray for our United Methodist missionaries who are laboring in the name of Jesus for peace with justice. And pray about the ways you can be a peacemaker in the corner of the world in which you live.

Even though it is difficult, don't give up on peace. Insofar as we claim our call to "be peace," we claim our faith in God whose vision for the world is of a people and all creation living in harmony, in unity, in love, and — yes! — in peace.

Many of you got a glimpse of RMN's vision for the future in my February presentation or more recent conversations we have had. RMN has a plan to grow so we can continue to walk with individuals and congregations. At a time when some believe that our job is done now that the harmful language has been removed from the Discipline, RMN's planned growth is both exciting and challenging. We are discerning the right next right steps now as we develop a strategic plan. Our work is relational and step one is reaching out across local congregations and annual conferences to build deeper connections. We will spend time listening and learning.

At this time, we need the engagement of Reconciling Methodists in multiple ways.

We need at least three or four Foundry folks to become RMN ambassadors. You would be on a team of leaders who will help us provide information in local areas through individual, congregational and conference connections and will share with us feedback from local areas. Then, of course there is the need to support this work financially. To make our dreams a reality we are asking individuals and congregations to make a five-year commitment to our new pledge campaign, Onward Pledge. We have set our goals: at least 400 individual pledges by the end of July and 250 congregations pledging financial support for 5 years by the end of the year.
