# The Power of Shared Service

Every year Foundry partners with Rise Against Hunger to pack meals for communities experiencing food insecurity around the globe. This work is more important than ever as foreign aid providing life-saving food has been cut. As of now, Foundry has packed more than 200,000 meals that have been sent to Vietnam, Timor-Leste, and Madagascar, just to name a few.

This year, it was especially good to be together to do direct service on our Spring Great Day of Service, Sunday, May 4. More than 90 Foundry members of every age measured and weighed rice, dehydrated vegetables and protein powder, sealed bags, packed boxes — and hit the gong every 1,000 meals.

During this time when the weight of problems in our city and country is overwhelming, it feels good to be able to do something tangible. Serving together reminds us that we have beloved community that can lift our spirits and strengthen us for the work ahead — work that we don't have to do alone.

The story of the Last Supper in the Gospel of John begins with an act of service, Jesus washing the disciples' feet. We found it fitting to have our Spring Great Day of Service on a communion Sunday when we also engaged in acts of service involving food.

Likewise, as the story of loaves and fishes multiplies what's available to feed the masses, our shared gifts have a larger impact when we use them to serve.



And it's not only important that we seek to serve by meeting the physical needs of others, but to also continue advocating meaningful policies to address root causes of hunger and poverty. As part of our Great Day of Service, we also contacted elected leaders to emphasize the importance of foreign aid and the protection of nutrition programs at home and abroad.

# Making More Than Music

In 2010, I volunteered to help with Foundry children's choir. I played piano while Pam Lanford led the singing. In one memorable visit to The Methodist Home, Pam was rehearsing Amazing Grace with the kids. Focusing on consonants, Pam tangled up the "h" and the "f" in the line, "Twas grace that taught my heart to fear." I think we skipped that verse in that performance, and for several years afterward.

Children's music is now part of Children's Worship. Natalie leads a program that includes elements of the service, such as the traditional greeting and response, "The Lord be with you. And also with you." We ask the children for prayer requests, which is their chance to share what they did the past week or what they are looking forward to or worried about in the week ahead: birthday parties, tests, visits with grandparents, and finer points of Minecraft are frequent topics.

We then come to my favorite part, time for singing at the piano. Recently, we've been working on For the Beauty of the Earth as we've been talking about Earth Day. Jaya Ho is a perennial favorite. High school senior James Iveson found that one about 10 years ago in the red hymnal (478) and the kids have been singing it ever since. We also sing Christmas songs throughout the year. Singing is followed by a lesson, then a game or activity.

I have met so many fun kids and their parents, wonderful people I would not have met otherwise. I now know elementary schoolchildren, teenagers, college students and their parents, who range from my age to decades younger. One former Foundry kid now sings with a Yale glee club, and I was able to go to their recent performance in Chevy Chase. Whenever we have a new baby in Foundry, I start a mental count down until the day they can join us upstairs.



There is always room for more volunteers, and it's an easy role to fill. Just the presence of more grown-ups can help calm the children down and guide them in focusing on our activities. # Foundry Recognized for Fair Trade Participation

Sales of fairly traded coffee, tea, chocolate, dried fruits, and olive oil during the Advent season is a longstanding mission effort started by the former Peace and Justice Mission. Fair Trade is a way of doing business that ultimately aims to do justice — to advance economic, social, and environmental goals such as raising/stabilizing the incomes of small-scale farmers, farm workers, and artisans, and promoting safe and sustainable farming methods and working conditions.

Foundry works with Equal Exchange, a cooperative that works directly with small farmers' groups to ensure that the farmers get a fair price for their products and that the products are of high quality. Equal Exchange recently notified us that Foundry was among the top 100 congregations purchasing fairly-traded products in 2024.



Equal Exchange works with faith-based groups that get wholesale prices and generally free shipping — savings that are passed on Foundry folk.

During the COVID crisis, we formed an informal "coffee club" to buy more or less quarterly, combining people's orders to be able to buy at wholesale prices and encouraging us to buy fairly-traded products year round.
