# We're the Backup Plan

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit." John 20:21–22

Someone has imagined a conversation Jesus had with the archangel Gabriel when Jesus returned to heaven after the ascension.

"You mean," Gabriel said, "your whole plan to save the world depends on that ragtag bunch of 120 former fishermen, women, and tax collectors?"

"That's right," Jesus replied.

"But what if they fail?" Gabriel persisted with alarm. "What's your backup plan?"

"There is no backup plan," Jesus said.

There is still no backup plan. "As the Father has sent me, so I send you..."

God sent Jesus out of love to share the gift of life in God, the gift of hope, the gift of mercy and forgiveness. And Jesus sends his disciples — sends us — in the same way.

As the "sent" people of God, the church is the instrument of God's mission. It's not that we, the church, have a mission, but that God's mission has a church.

As members of the Body of Christ, the Church, we are all missionaries, sent by Jesus, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to live within this challenging moment in history as fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ, ambassadors of God's love and mercy, cultivators of peace with justice.



To be a sent people is to recognize that being a disciple of Jesus is not just about "going to church" to save our own soul. Rather, our being "sent" is about being transformed by the grace, love, and mercy of God in community so that, strengthened by God, we can live in a way that furthers God's mission of liberating love and mercy in the world.

Rather than just going to church, it's about being the church all the time and in all the places that we find ourselves. John Wesley famously declared that the world was his parish. What if, in every realm of your life, you understood yourself as a missionary of God's church?

As we move through the Great Fifty Days of Easter, we'll be thinking together about what it means to be an Easter people, to be the church, to be sent into the world to love and serve right here, right now. I hope we'll see you in worship, study, service, and fellowship so that, together God's mission will grow!

# More Than Money

I started attending Foundry soon after moving to Washington from Sacramento, California.

Over the next few years, I participated in creative worship, the prayer team, the point-in-time count of unhoused neighbors, the racial justice team and LBGTQ+ advocacy at General Conference. At the same time, my jobs in international and national peace and justice put me in touch with people of many religions as well as atheists and secular communities.

The Foundry community showed me what it means to live into the gospel through vital transforming Bible study, prayer, worship, and working for justice and compassion. The five years I spent at Foundry and in DC provided me what I needed to be confident pursuing a seminary education and ordained ministry.

I also knew by that time how expensive DC is and how much grad school costs. During my four years in seminary, I was supported by my Foundry family with friendship, prayer, scholarships, and even meals during finals.

That support allowed me to work and study with the communities in DC that deepened my confidence. The financial support may not have been much, but it meant I could afford the books I needed and time to take my immersion trips and summer courses.



Now, I strive to share that same support and love I experienced at Foundry in my new home in Iowa as the associate chaplain at Grinnell College. In my new position at Grinnell, I provide one-on-one care to all students, support a student-run hotline for people experiencing sexual assault and dating violence, provide interfaith and social justice leadership, connect the college and town, and support the religious student groups on campus.

I pray I'm able to share the Foundry love that inspired me in word and deed, that sustained me, that deepened my call and leadership. I miss Foundry so much even as I know I'm where God has called me to be.

Foundry offers two types of one-year scholarships for students who are members or close associates of Foundry:

- the Alida Smith Memorial Scholarship for undergraduate or graduate students at any institution (community colleges, 4-year institutions, or graduate institutions) and
- the Edward W. Bauman Scholarship for those attending seminary and planning to enter Christian ministry upon graduation.

Any student who is a member of or closely associated with Foundry United Methodist Church (for example, a regular attendee, a participant in Foundry mission activities, the immediate family member of a Foundry member) is eligible to apply.
