Knocking on Closed Doors GUY CECIL



In 1963, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. published **Strength to Love**, a collection of writings and sermons. Rooted in his deep knowledge of Scripture and his God-inspired sense of conviction, it has become critical to how I think about putting my faith into action.

In one writing, King focuses on the parable that begins at Luke 11:5.

"Suppose you have a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; a friend of mine on a journey has come to me, and I have no food to offer him.' And suppose the one inside answers, 'Don't bother me. The door is already locked, and my children and I are in bed. I can't get up and give you anything.' I tell you, even though he will not get up and give you the bread because of friendship, yet because of your shameless audacity he will surely get up and give you as much as you need." King uses this parable to highlight that it is midnight in the social order, in our politics, within the church, and within people themselves. And as only he can do, he shines a light on the people outside, knocking on the door, told to go away or never answered at all.

King's words also describe the state of our world today. Sixty years later, it can still feel like midnight and so many are knocking on closed doors. Millions of us are plagued with increasing anxiety, children are struggling in the classroom and in relationships, mass shootings are commonplace, increasing cruelty and harm are inflicted on our transgender siblings, and thousands of churches are leaving our denomination because we dare to extend open arms, minds, hearts, and doors to our LGBTQ+ siblings.

In these times, I am most grateful for Foundry United Methodist Church – a home for those who need healing and grace – and a gathering place for shamelessly audacious doorknockers.

As I begin my service as President of the Foundry Board, I am grateful for the opportunity to be in ministry with you – to love God, love each other, and change the world.

Foundry Awards Scholarships for 2023/2024

In September, three members of the Foundry community are heading off to school with a little help from their Foundry friends. The Scholarship Ministry Team recommended, and the Foundry Board approved, these awards totaling \$8,845.

Emily Farnell is starting her second year at Yale Divinity School and is benefitting from an Edward W. Bauman Scholarship (named for Foundry's senior pastor from 1964 to 1992) for those attending seminary and planning to enter Christian ministry.

Hailey Baker and VaShawn McIlwain-Lightfoot are receiving awards from the Alida Smith Memorial Scholarship (named for D.C. educator and Foundry member Alida Smith) for undergraduate and graduate students at any institution.

Hailey is entering her freshman year at Fordham University where she plans to major in Humanitarian Studies.

VaShawn is finishing his PhD in Musical Arts/Vocal Music Performance at the University of Maryland.

Foundry offers these two types of scholarships each year. Foundry members and those closely associated with Foundry are eligible to apply. Foundry has been a reconciling community for almost 30 years – and right now the Reconciling Ministries Network, led by Foundry member Jan Lawrence, needs our help.

First, some of the grants RMN is applying for these days look for the number of constituents it has. So, members of reconciling congregations are encouraged to sign up as **a Reconciling United Methodist (RUM).** You can sign up here. (https://rmnetwork.org/rum/).

The goal is to have at least 50,000 constituents by next year's General Conference. And if you have friends in other UM Churches, encourage them to sign up as well!

Second, RMN is also now preparing for **Onward to Perfection**, its convocation in Charlotte, NC. October 13–15. You can register to attend or be a sponsor, using this link. At the convocation, there will be a preview of RMN's first Vacation Bible School Curriculum, **Just Like Me**, (which Foundry gave RMN money to develop). It will be ready for use in Summer 2024. RMN hopes to continue such work on curriculum each year, focusing on Sunday School or VBS.

Third, RMN needs our financial support for these months leading up to next year's General Conference, which could be the event at which the UMC becomes a Church that more fully reflects Foundry's values of justice, equity and inclusion.

During the 11:15 service on August 20th, a new group of voices rose from dedicated front pews to sing with the choir, "The Church of Christ in Every Age." It was the launch of Foundry's Congregational Choir, a music ministry open to all in the Foundry community who share a love of singing.

"We've opened a space that makes possible the beauty and fellowship of choir singing for those whose time is limited and whose voices might otherwise only be heard behind closed doors," says Yolanda Bryant, the Foundry Choir section leader who now coordinates lay participation in this new ministry. "Everyone needs to know there is a place for them in the music ministry. The Congregational Choir is that place that will give you a sense of belonging. No judgments. Just worship with heart and voice."

The Congregational Choir welcomes singers of all abilities. No audition or ongoing commitment is required. Plenty of support is offered. Before the Sunday on which the Congregational Choir will sing, participants receive the score and a recording of the piece to be presented. On the Sunday mornings the Congregational Choir sings, they rehearse at 10:45.



Foundry's Music Director Stanley Thurston and members of the Chancel Choir are embracing their role encouraging and mentoring the Congregational Choir. "This is our opportunity to wrap our arms around you long before you're wrapped in harmony," Yolanda says.

The Congregational Choir will sing Robert Ray's **Gospel Mass** Sunday, September 10 and will be featured again on Sunday, October 22.
